This evening we do have a public hearing for the prequalification regulations for Henry Phillips Barn at Howell Living History Farm.

I will turn it over to our deputy administrator, Mr. Watson. Welcome. Good to see you again, sir.

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So, in the interest of time for the freeholders, because I know you've got a lot on your agenda, and currently I'm a little bit under the weather here and I'll spare a long introduction.

I think we all know why we're here.

But just to give you a brief intro, we're here for the purpose a historic home. It's a late twentieth century home that's built in the Pleasant Valley Historic District on the property of Howell Living History Farm, something that I think we all agree is a jewel to Mercer County.

We are endeavoring to make some renovations to the western section of the Phillips Barn. We'll complete the overall restoration of this barn complex. The siding and the roofing will be stripped off, the timber frame will be disassembled, repaired and re-erected. There will be a public barn raising event held. New painted siding, doors and roofing installed on the western section. The interior will also have new wood

1 flooring.

Now, someone who can speak to this far more eloquently than I is our consultant Chris Pickell.

Just to give you a little background on Chris. Chris is working on several projects in Mercer County, most mainly the Fish Barn that's currently housed at the Living History Farm, as well as the Equestrian Center, and the red barn that's out at Mercer Meadows.

For the purposes of the hearing, also with me today, from the Mercer County Park

Commission, is the assistant executive director,

Joseph Pizza, P-i-z-z-a; the second person is Pete

Watson, Pete is our director of Howell Living

History Farm; and the third gentleman is Herman

Snyder, S-n-y-d-e-r, and Herman is the project

manager on the job.

 $$\operatorname{So},$$ with your permission, I'd like to bring up Mr. Pickell.

CHAIR CIMINO: Absolutely. Thank you so much.

MR. A. T. WATSON: You're welcome.

CHAIR CIMINO: Welcome.

MR. PICKELL: Thank you.

THE REPORTER: Sir, please state your name and spell your last name.

MR. PICKELL: Christopher Pickell, P-i-c-k-e-l-l. My firm is Pickell Architecture, in Flemington.

I've worked with the Living History

Farm for a long time now and have done a series of renovations on their main barn next to the farmhouse.

We've moved horses into one of the wings of the barn, and we've rehabbed the main section of the barn, and straightened the cupola. This is probably over the last 10 years or so.

The last remaining piece to restoring that barn is through the western section. The timber frame there is actually one of the oldest ones on the property. We've added on to the main barn. The timbers there we believe are from the late eighteenth century, 1780, or somewhere around there.

The material is white oak cut locally. We don't know when the barn was originally erected, but at some point it was moved and joined to the main barn there, which is from the early nineteenth century.

So, it's very specialized work. In order to repair and restore this, we need to essentially take off the roof and take off the siding, disassemble the timber frame by taking the pegs out and lowering it down to the ground and making repairs, replacing some of the missing pieces, and then reassembling and re-erecting that.

And we'd like to, as we did with the Charles Fish Barn, we'd like to have a public barn raising, so when these timbers get swung back up into the air, it's very scary, it's very dangerous, and it's very exciting. But we did it successfully for the Visitor Center Barn, and we'd like to do that again for this barn.

So, this work is very, very specialized, there's not many people in the state who can do it, so we need to have a prequalification statement.

I don't know if you want me to go through what that specifically is, because it's a 12-page document, but essentially we're asking for people to demonstrate that they've worked on historic projects that's been supervised by a panoply of people that work for the state

preservation office and that they can demonstrate that they've worked on timber frames in the past.

And normally we ask for experience on three similar projects, but in this case we're just asking for two, because specialized work just doesn't get done that often, but we need people who are qualified to do the work.

So, any questions?

14 like bugs in the wood or termites?

MR. PICKELL: That's an excellent

16 question.

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No, we haven't observed any. And normally when we do this, we don't actually fumigate. Sometimes if you're selling someone's house, it could be closed. We actually do something to kill the insects.

In this case, it's been standing there for a hundred years, and we don't see evidence of termite damage. We're redoing the foundation, so we should actually minimize the

- ability of insects to get up in the bottom of the timbers.
- So, that's a very good question. But no, we're not chemically treating the timbers.

- MR. PICKELL: Yes.
- FREEHOLDER FRISBY: Great work. I

- MR. PICKELL: It was transformational work.
- FREEHOLDER FRISBY: That was phenomenal work. Thank you.
- CHAIR CIMINO: Freeholder Koontz.
- VICE CHAIR KOONTZ: I guess I have just two questions.
- Programmatically, how is the barn intended to fit in?
- Can you just give me a general idea

 of how large--maybe you can answer, how large of a

 project is this in terms of square footage?
- MR. PICKELL: The barn is about 24
 feet by 24 feet. So that's less than 600 square
 feet. It's pretty small. There's a small

addition here and there. It's probably about 600 1 square feet. It's not a large project. It's a specialized project. The cost isn't great.

CHAIR CIMINO: Welcome.

MR. P. WATSON: Good evening. Thanks for the opportunity to talk about our barn.

As Mr. Pickell was saying--

THE REPORTER: You're Peter Watson?

MR. P. WATSON: My name is Peter

Watson, Howell Living History Farm, Mercer County Park Commission.

The barn is going to be used primarily for education. This section is the oldest section. However, it was added in the 1930s, when the then owner needed to expand the barn in order to run his dairy operation.

So, when this gift was given to Mercer County, it included several phases of construction that went over nearly two centuries. And this is the oldest structure. However, it was the most recently added.

But because it doesn't function as

the area where we keep the horses or the threshing, it's the education section. So that becomes an area where school children on a daily basis are grinding corn, threshing wheat, learning about how crops are processed for animal feed, fiber for textiles, and how some of this is used as food.

And so it's a critical part of the mission of the farm. And I think that program theme carries into the actual construction, or reconstruction of the barn, because, as some of you may recall, when we did the Charles Fish Barn, we had all of the pegs made by local school children.

So, you know, these are examples of what our school children will be making. And when you disassemble an old barn, you have to drive the old pegs out because they're frozen in there. You can't salvage them, or you rarely do.

So what will happen is they'll go out in the woods with us, we'll use a two-person saw to cut down a white oak tree, they'll help us bring it back to the barn using horses or oxen, animals, and they'll then use a froe and a mallet to make what are called blanks, and that's a

square or rectangular piece, which they then use a drawknife to shape into a peg. When they're done, they sign their name on it, and we burn that over.

Then, as each of the barn frames or bents are laying on the ground before they're raised, they have to be assembled, the beams, the girds, the columns, and as the mortis and tenon joints are put back together, they're predrilled so that they can receive the pegs.

So, each child comes up, puts their peg in, drives it in, and we record the location Inside that barn there will be a afterwards. series of bronze plaques which show the location of each peg and the school children who made it. So that becomes part of the process.

And that was always the vision that all of you and the Mercer County Park Commission It was not just to present the farm as a had. finished piece, but to actually involve the public, particularly school children, in the process.

## **INFORMAL MEETING OF MARCH 26, 2019**

#### **MINUTES**

Chair Cimino called the Agenda Meeting to order at 6:05 PM on March 26, 2019 in Room 211 of the Joyce McDade Administration Building, 640 South Broad Street, Trenton, New Jersey.

#### **ROLL CALL:**

Present- Freeholders Cannon, Colavita, Frisby, Koontz, Melker, Walter and Cimino

#### **SUNSHINE LAW:**

The Clerk to the Board announced that in accordance with the provisions of the New Jersey Open Public Meeting Law, notice of this Agenda Meeting had been mailed to The Trenton Times, The Trentonian and The Princeton Packet newspapers as well having been posted in both the County Administration Building and Courthouse at least forty-eight (48) hours in advance of the meeting.

At this time, Chair Cimino welcomed George Fallat, County Engineer, to discuss the proposed Resolution amending Resolution No. 2017-437, adopted September 28, 2017, and authorizing the County Executive and Clerk to the Board to execute an Amendment (Amendment No. 1) to the Professional Services Agreement with Cherry Weber and Associates[herein referred to as Van Cleef Engineering Associates, LLC] for the County Route 533 traffic signal system and improvements project in the townships of Hamilton, Lawrence and West Windsor {NJDOT Job No. 65006401}. Amend the Resolution to reflect the vendor name change, extend the period until the completion of the project, and to increase the contract amount by \$31,725.25 [+12%] resulting in a revised total contract amount not to exceed: \$304.943.01.

Mr. Fallat responded that Cherry Weber and Associates was awarded a contract to provide construction inspection services for County Route 533 for a traffic signal system and improvement project adopted September 28, 2017. He said services included daily oversight of construction work and preparing the necessary documentation as required by the New Jersey Department of Transportation, who was funding both construction and construction inspection. He added that he received notice to proceed for both construction and construction inspection that was issued on February 20, 2018, with an anticipated completion date of December 17, 2018. He commented that due to weather delays, clarification on required field changes, as well as, delays experienced by the contractor in receiving materials, the overall project completion date was extended to March 2019. He noted that Orchard Holdings is the contractor.

Freeholder Walter said her understanding was that Cherry Weber had the initial contract to finish by a specific date and once Van Cleef took over the contract an issue had occurred.

Chair Cimino asked if the language was included in the original scope.

Mr. Fallat said the specifications were included in the original scope. He said Orchard Holdings, who is the contractor, placed a bid on the project. The project was expected to end December 17, 2018, however, the project was extended to March due to weather-related issues.

Chair Cimino was concerned that since Orchard Holding contract ended December 17, 2018, the County should go after liquidated damages for not abiding by the agreement. He said he understands Cherry Weber's position, but Orchard Holding should be responsible for the additional cost.

Mr. Fallat explained that he is looking into the issue and that the contract end date was December 17, 2018, however under the State of New Jersey specifications, projects are allowed extensions due to weather, utility conflicts, and several other issues.

Chair Cimino replied that the issue is with the contractor.

Mr. Fallat requested to amend the contract for additional funding for the construction and inspection services because the contract went behind the December 17, 2018.

Freeholder Walter asked which contract needs to be amended.

Mr. Fallat said the contract is for County Route 533 traffic signal system and improvements project in the townships of Hamilton, Lawrence, and West Windsor. He said the agreement is with Van Cleef Engineering Associates in the amount of \$273,217.76, however, with an increased amount of \$31,725.25, the revised total contract amount is \$304,943.01.

Freeholder Koontz interpreted that the County contracted with two contractors, the primary contractor providing the construction work and the inspection contractor handling compliance issues. He said the inspection contractor needs an extension because the duration of the main contract went longer than expected, and now inspection services are required longer. He said the inspection contractors are not responsible for the overage time with the main contractor.

Mr. Fallat agreed with Freeholder Koontz's explanation.

Chair Cimino said he understands the process; however, the County should have liquidated damages on a contract that should end December 17, 2018. He said if the County had liquidated clauses in the contracts, why is the County not going after the contractor who performed the work to regain the \$31,725.25. Now, the County has to expend back to Cherry Weber for their inability to complete the contract by December 17, 2018.

Freeholder Koontz said the County could pursue that option; however, the County would need to extend the contract and seek reimbursement afterward.

Mr. Fallat agreed with Freeholder Koontz, adding that the County would pay for what is used to help close out the project. He explained that \$31,725.75 is the maximum amount that would be fully reimbursed from the State and that Cherry Weber could help the County go after the contractor. He indicated that the project is expected to be finished at the end of March.

Chair Cimino asked would the County potentially entertain liquidated damages on the contractor.

Paul Adezio, County Counsel, recommended moving forward with extending the inspection contract to complete the job. He concurred to go after Cherry Weber to recoup the money.

Freeholder Walter said before funds are released the Board would need an update.

#### **COMMUNICATIONS:**

Five (5) Communications were discussed and approved for placement on the Agenda for the Formal Meeting of March 28, 2019.

#### **RESOLUTIONS:**

Twenty-five (25) Resolutions were discussed and approved for placement on the Agenda for the Formal Meeting of March 28, 2019.

Chair Cimino referred to the proposed Resolution authorizing to rescind Resolution No. 98-467, adopted December 10, 1998, canceling a proposed transfer of ownership of real property and authorizing the return of a deposit received from Jingoli Real Estate, LLC, \$3,750.00, together with any accrued interest, property Block 372, Lot 1, Ewing Township.

Andrew Mair, County Administrator, responded that the accrued interest dollars and interest are to be determined and that the subject is not addressed in the agreement between Jingoli and the County.

Chair Cimino said he was unsure about adopting a Resolution without significant information.

#### **PUBLIC SECTION:**

At this time, Chair Cimino invited the public to comment on any item listed on the agenda.

There were no comments.
