Executive Director Joseph Pizza provided a synopsis of the report: Revenue continues to be steady. Golf is ahead of last year's totals by about \$20,000. The pool is having its best year - we're approximately \$37,000 above last year with a week or so to go before the pool closes for the season. I'm pleased to report concert ticket sales are up about \$6,000 over last year. Overall, we are in good shape as we head into our fall and winter seasons.

> OLD BUSINESS

- Sean Hartmann, Assistant Greens Superintendent, gave a wrap up on Golf, stating they are up to approximately 22,000 rounds for the month. Staff have been busy with tournaments and are getting ready for the fall outing season. The maintenance crew has solidified the fall aerification schedule at all courses.

- Mike Melker, General Supervisor of Parks, reported on the busy summer preparations for the weekly events at the festival grounds. Maintenance crews are aerating, seeding and cutting grass every day, and trades are busy with daily requests from facility managers.
- Anthony Cucchi, Superintendent of Parks, updated the status of several capital projects including the Lawrence Hopewell Trail upgrades, Dam Site 21 dredging and trail projects, Vitteritto property clean up, Trenton Wharf, and the Quarry. He also shared news that he is stepping down from his role at the Park Commission, moving on to the next step in his career. He expressed his appreciation for everything he's learned and all the support he has received during his time at the Park Commission.

Commissioner Koontz asked if this is a full reconstruction of the tennis courts?

Executive Director Pizza responded that it is only one court, the "stadium court."

Commissioner Koontz also asked if staff had any views on post tension concrete for reconstruction of tennis courts.

Executive Director Pizza explained that, while he does not have any knowledge of post tension concrete, the work is being done because of a drainage problem where water is trapped underneath the court, making it spongy and soft. A previous attempt to correct this was unsuccessful and the court is now unplayable. To fix the issue, a new drainage system will be installed and the court will be resurfaced.

Commissioner Koontz asked for the reason the work was not completed under the original contract.

Superintendent Cucchi responded that the initial contract was for a one-year period but there were delays with the permitting component. The initial piece of the contract was to assist the New Jersey Department of Transportation (NJDOT) in preparing and submitting a permit application to the Historic Preservation Office. Because of delays on the DOT side, the submission was finished but not the actual design interpretation, which will be the bulk of this contract. The contract couldn't be extended because it had expired, so now we have to enter into a new contract. The funding that was left in that contract was cancelled and will be used in the new awarded contract.

Commissioner Forrester asked if there is any value to the machines being replaced and, if so, what is being done with them?

Executive Director Pizza explained that typically, the machines are used until they no longer function and then are auctioned off. However, the equipment being replaced here was lost two years ago during Hurricane Ida. There is still a lot that hasn't been replaced

yet. We are just starting to get the necessary capital funds and we are addressing the most urgent needs first.

Commissioner Mooij asked if there is a replacement plan for future?

Executive Director Pizza explained that our capital program is not just for building maintenance and improvements, but also for vehicle inventory. Vehicles are replaced after they get a certain number of "hours". We are a little bit behind because financial issues over the last two years. We are doing the best we can with the dollars that are available.

Commissioner Mooij asked if there is a plan for staging locations for future storm events?

Executive Director Pizza responded affirmatively. During hurricane Ida we lost all the equipment at Princeton Country Club and Hopewell Valley Golf Course. Now, when we know that a storm is coming we move everything out of the garages that have flooded in the past.

Executive Director Pizza responded yes and explained that we originally wanted upgrade all of the lighting in the park, but it was cost prohibitive. We are able to do the rink and the tennis center with our in-house electricians because the county CFO was able to free up funds so that we could purchase the actual fixtures to do those two locations.

Commissioner Mooij asked for a refresher on the plans.

Executive Director Pizza responded that Phase One was a five million dollar grant that was procured for interior renovations to the stadium, and that Phase Two is for exterior renovations with the playing field, in particular, and extending the fences. Right now, the ballpark does not meet the standards for major league baseball, so this is part of assisting the Trenton Thunder in becoming affiliated with a major league team again. The administration is behind this and supporting it.

> EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Prior to the Executive Director's report, Park Commission Counsel, R. David Blake, gave an update on the Kevin Bannon case and shared a copy of the Order of Disqualification from Future Public Office or Employee, barring Mr. Bannon from future public employment or office.

- Golf:

- At my request, our golf staff to put together training sessions to increase awareness and sensitivity to people with disabilities. I want to thank Connor Moffatt, Brian Zarzecki, and Bob Kauth for taking the lead on putting together an agenda for the training sessions and finding a guest speaker. I would also like to thank the entire golf supervisory staff for their support in ensuring people with disabilities have every opportunity to go out and enjoy playing the game.
- We are preparing for our Annual Employee Golf Outing. This year's outing will be held at Mountain View Golf Course. The fee is \$75.00 and includes breakfast, lunch, and a staff shirt. There will be prizes for closest to the pin and longest shot.

- Tennis:

- This Monday, 24 junior tennis players selected from our program traveled to the US Open in NYC to demonstrate their skills at the Billie Jean King National Tennis Center. This marks the second year our tennis program has been invited to attend the Net Generation Program at the US Open.
- Congratulations to Marc, Devin, and our tennis staff for the good work they are doing in making our tennis program second to none!

Stewardship:

- Over at Rosedale Lake, a group from ISLES, along with some of our Stewardship volunteers, participated in the removal of invasive species around Rosedale Lake.
- Mike Long will be meeting with the Federally Recognized Tribes on October 7 to discuss and advance our Living Shoreline Project.

Environmental Education / Nature Center:

- The Environmental Education department will be providing a series of afterschool programs for first and second graders at Foundation Academies this year. This program is an extension of the relationship our Nature Center staff started with Foundations during our Art League program.
- Director Kelly Rypkema met with ISLES recently to explore the idea of incorporating ISLES Climate Corps programs to assist with our Native Plant and Garden Stewardship initiatives.
- Nature Center staff, along with Friends of the Abbott Marshlands, will meet with Trenton Area Stakeholders on September 10 to discuss Nature Center programing and ways to expand and collaborate.

- Howell Farm/Capital City Farm:

- Mercer County Summer Interns spent one of their two end-of-season career exploration days at Howell Farm and Capital City Farm touring the facilities and helping harvest crops for local food banks and pantries. At Howell Farm, they harvested several hundred pounds of potatoes that they added to melons and tomatoes that were picked at Capital City Farm for distribution through a new program with Rutgers Cooperative Extension Service.
- At Howell Farm, a record 700 people attended the annual Fiddling on the Farm event that included a fine exhibition performance by Commissioner Andrew Koontz. The event features judging and prizes in adult and youth divisions and attracts talent from all over the tri-state area.
- Fall school programs are filling quickly and include new content that aligns with New Jersey Core Curriculum standards. The farm's education staff is meeting with Capital City Farm staff to develop joint programming.

Stables:

- Summer Camps and Summer programs concluded on August 25. The Stables had a successful summer with many compliments from parents.
- September/October program registration opened August 26. All lesson spots and Tiny Riders programs are filled. September/October session begins September 3.
- Heads-Up, Friends of Mercer County Stables, received a horse donation August 7.
 Maple Syrup, a 14-year-old mare, has been a very nice addition to the Stables' program horses.

- Recreation & Events:

- Our Summer Concert Series in the Festival Grounds concluded last Friday with Elton John / Billy Joel cover band and 2,629 attendees enjoying the show.
- Overall 7,743 people have come out to enjoy our concerts this season, surpassing last year's total attendance. Despite two rainouts and one hurricane, we had a great summer concert season and we still have a winter indoor concert at Mercer Oaks on December 5 with The Nerds.
- My sincere thanks to our Recreation Staff, Dean Gray and Peter Bullock; Park Maintenance Staff, Mike Rossi and Mike Melker; Park Rangers, Dave Buxton, and our Chief of Finance, Nanci Lambert for a job well done. Thank you!

Wildlife Center:

• Wildlife Center staff released Red Foxes last week. I was able to participate in this fun and easy exercise. If any of you have the time and would like to assist in releases, wildlife staff will be doing releases throughout the fall. We can include you on the emails. I encourage you come out, if your schedule allows.

- Hopewell Valley Pool:

- Pool season is winding down. The last of our birthday parties is scheduled for this upcoming weekend.
- This season, the pool has made over \$112,000 in sales.
- \$60,000 in season passes were sold, which is almost double from last season.
- We also maintained a little over \$50,000 in sales for walk ups which is equal to last season.
