FORMAL MEETING OF JANUARY 26, 2017

MINUTES

Chair Colavita called the Formal Meeting to order at 6:00PM on January 26, 2017 in Room 211 of the Joyce L. McDade Administration Building, 640 South Broad Street, Trenton, New Jersey.

ROLL CALL:

The following members of the Board answered the Roll Call of the Deputy Clerk to the Board:

Present- Freeholders Cannon, Cimino, Frisby, Koontz, Verrelli, and Colavita Absent- Freeholder Walter
The Deputy Clerk to the Board read the Invocation.

Chair Colavita led the Pledge of Allegiance and Salute to the Flag.

The Deputy Clerk to the Board announced that in accordance with the provision of the New Jersey Open Public Meeting Law, notice of this Formal Meeting had been mailed to The Trenton Times, The Trentonain and The Princeton Packet newspapers as well as having been posted in both the County Administrator Building and Courthouse at least forty-eight (48) hours in advance of the meeting.

At this time, Chair Colavita invited the public to comment on any listed on the Agenda.

Kelvin Ganges, Chief of Staff, introduced Dwaine Williamson regarding his appointment to the Mercer County Community College Board of Trustees. Mr. Ganges also acknowledged Kamal Khana and Paul Belardo regarding their appointments to the Mercer County Improvement Authority. Mr. Ganges indicated that all the are engaged in their communities and will serve Mercer County well.

Mr. Khana and Mr. Belardo both thanked the County Executive, Brian M. Hughes, and Freeholder Board for providing them with the opportunity to serve on the MCIA Board.

Mr. Williamson also thanked the Board and County Executive for appointing him to the Mercer County Community College Board of Trustees. He added that was excited to start working on the board.

The Freeholder Board welcomed all the appointees to the Board and were looking forward to working with them.

Chair Colavita thanked the County Executive for selecting great candidates.

At this time, Chair Colavita welcomed Mary Gay Abbott-Young, Executive Director of Rescue Mission; Connie Mercer, Executive Director of Homefront; and Carolyn Biondi, Executive Director of Arm and Arm. A representative from each organization appeared before the Board regarding the emergency shelter funding crisis in Mercer County. (See attached "A" attached hereto and made a part hereof). Chair Colavita stated that the Freeholder Board was not involved in the evaluation process.

Ms. Abbott-Young stated that the State of New Jersey is showing a decrease in the program for emergency benefits.

Ms. Mercer added that the County of Mercer works together with Homefront to prevent homelessness by providing funding to the agencies. She said people who are eligible to receive assistance have been denied by the State and that State funding has decreased. Ms. Mercer said soon, Homefront will not be to offer assistance to homeless children.

Ms. Biondi was also concerned with the budget cuts from the State. Arm and Arm is responsible for providing assistance to individuals to pay their rent.

Mr. Hughes said it is important to work together to make sure every child has a place to live.

EMERGENCY SHELTER FUNDING CRISIS PREPARED BY RESCUE MISSION OF TRENTON

Summary

Shelters are crucial to saving lives as they provide immediate intervention and essential lifesustaining services. Further, emergency shelters provide access to other systems to end homelessness.

Unfortunately, due to a strict interpretation of the eligibility rules for General Assistance and Emergency Assistance, over the past year a crisis has emerged in the State funding mechanism for emergency shelter services. Emergency Assistance has long been a staple in the State of New Jersey, Department of Human Services support for the emergency response network - used for shelter reimbursement, motel placements, transitional housing, and extending into housing subsidies. Due to a decrease of individuals being considered eligible for GA funding (typically due to noncompliance with enrollment process), the associated EA funding stream to emergency services providers has ceased.

The change in emergency assistance funding is threatening the viability of the entire emergency response system. As resources diminish, there is a coupling effect that will continue to cause a collapse of the emergency response system, as within both the network of providers and among the broader community we will witness ever lessening support for a decent, compassionate response to the devastation of homelessness.

Statement of Problem

Mercer County is nationally recognized for its work to end homelessness and has demonstrated County-wide commitment to Housing First and Rapid ReHousing, resulted in a great number of individuals moving out of homelessness and into permanent housing. Despite these nationally recognized successes in decreasing homelessness, even in a community like Mercer County there remains a crucial need for emergency shelter.

As the sole provider of shelter services to the single adult homeless population in Mercer County, the Rescue Mission operates a year round, nightly emergency shelter, daily day drop-in center, as well as access to basic social services, including a point of entry to accessing housing. During fiscal year 2016 (July 1, 2015 – June 30, 2016), the Mission's Emergency Shelter served 1,226 separate individuals. During the very cold days of winter it is not at all uncommon to see over 200 individuals come to the Mission for respite from the elements; this past year 124 clients on average used the Emergency Shelter, with higher daily census during weather emergencies. The Day Center provided 28,860 service days over the course of the year, and there were 45,227 shelter stays for individuals using the Nightly Emergency Shelter.

Fifty-five percent of the individuals who utilized the Mission's emergency shelter in the course of a year did so for seven days or less. Another 43% utilized the shelter for 8 – 60 days in the course of the year. As the data indicates, many individuals depend on the emergency shelter as a temporary intervention for a period of unstable housing and quickly exit the emergency services system.

A lack of income coupled with the multitude of challenges our homeless clients face (in FY2016 29% self-reported having a substance abuse problem, 32% reported a mental health condition, 24% reported a disabling physical condition, 30% reported a challenging chronic health condition, and 7% reported developmental disorder) highlights the need for emergency shelter as well as

sheds light on factors contributing to a low compliance rate for following through with benefit applications.

While the Mission has worked diligently to position our agency to best meet the needs of those we serve, a decrease in public funding for the Emergency Services program has reached crisis levels. While Emergency Assistance had traditionally accounted for approximately \$140,000 funding to the Mission's Emergency Shelter program, in FY 2106 this amount was abruptly reduced to \$31,000. We anticipate virtually no EA funding in this current fiscal year.

This funding crisis was brought about due to a strict interpretation of the eligibility rules for General Assistance and Emergency Assistance, a staple in the State of New Jersey, Department of Human Services support for the emergency response network, used for shelter reimbursement, motel placements, transitional housing, and extending into housing subsidies. The departure from the long-term State practice and has quickly and inadvertently created a crisis.

It should be noted that this change in interpretation is adversely affecting the very population that the administration has so ardently committed to assisting and expanding services for: those with substance abuse issues, mental health concerns, and ex-offenders re-entering the community.

The funding crisis facing the Mission is mirrored by a marked increase in lack of income for individuals utilizing the shelter. In 2016, 71% of the 1,339 unduplicated individuals served in the shelter reported no income. This is up from 60% in 2011.

As a result of this funding crisis, the Mission has serious concerns about the sustainability of our Emergency Services Program. The Mission has been active with the NJ Coalition to End Homelessness, as emergency shelter providers throughout the state are echoing our concerns.

In September 2016 the Mission convened a community meeting to begin the dialogue on this topic in order to seek funding solutions to ensure that this life saving refuge is be available year round to not only protect the homeless from the elements, both hot and cold, but also to provide respite from the harsh realities of life on the street. This topic is one that has struck a chord with the community and has garnered media coverage. Since the community meeting on September 29, 2016 the Mission has been fortunate to receive funding from private foundations and individual contributors in order to offset the deficit of operating the shelter. While the Mission is sincerely grateful for these private contributions, we recognize that these contributions do not represent a long-term solution to funding emergency shelter in the state.

These contributions indicate the general consensus of our fellow citizens that belief that human beings should have shelter and the opportunity to build a life in a community. Every step we as a community take must include recognition of this public trust.

System Transformation

We can agree that the historic funding pattern of utilizing EA funding tied to client eligibility was developed over time based upon what was available, not necessarily what fits our current goal or meets the needs of the client's community. Further, we posit that the administration of government dollars, particularly EA, is cumbersome, unreliable and diverts many who work.

The cost to process applications, the delay in providing an emergency response, and the uncertainty of funding for providers is not an efficient business practice.

With this said, we recognize that government and nonprofit agencies both identify ending homelessness as a primary goal.

We need to change the system by repositioning previous EA dollars from an individual eligibility and compliance focus to service-based block funding. A reasonable formula to calculate the award of such funding would include payments to the emergency response system vendors on a fiscal year basis, with consideration of service utilization via HMIS records and point in time count.

This approach offers the additional advantage of supporting a dedicated resource of social/case workers to focus on developing individualized plans for ending homelessness and assisting recipients to become self-sufficient. Such a funding source would capture the needs of short term clients (the majority of individuals utilizing the shelter) who quickly move in and out of homelessness - who are never enrolled in a benefits program.

It would also provide predictability, control expenditures, and permit counties to address local needs in an equitable and appropriate manner, as well as not unfairly penalize clients whose addiction, mental health, and other disabilities may have affected their decision-making and ability to avoid homelessness and reliability to comply with attendance and other requirements.

Maintaining the emergency homeless response network is critical and possible. The Mission Statement of the Department of Human Services (DHS) (as indicated in its Departmental Budget) states that DHS "contracts, collaborates and partners with federal, state and community--based organizations to maximize resources and provide an array of services statewide that promote independence, dignity, choice and assistance for aging adults, individuals and families with low incomes and people with disabilities".

Elimination or reduction of the safety net provided by EA payments to applicants, who may be impaired, disabled, or otherwise unable to address deficiencies in their applications, ultimately does not save money. It only shifts the costs, and the problem, to other state programs and agencies. It does not address the underlying needs of these disabled residents of our state and is seemingly at odds with the stated mission of the DHS.

The Department has broad policy-making, rule-making and budget flexibility authority available to it. The current crisis is the time to use it.

Specific Ask

The previous payments to vendors using EA for shelter should be set aside as a direct project based contract with providers.

On behalf of the homeless and hungry in our community, thank you for always supporting our work and particularly to Chairman Colavita for arranging this time and Freeholder Frisby for encouraging us to directly alert the Board of this issue.

Why is it necessary for us to update the Board of Freeholders?

A crisis is brewing in our community – the safety net crafted by an incredible network of nonprofit providers in cooperation with local and county government is shredding.

The three of us, along with many wonderful colleagues in both the private and government sectors, spend a lot of time working together to provide a network of emergency services to the economically poor in our community.

We are proud of Mercer County where the County Executive Brian Hughes has received national recognition from the National Alliance to End Homelessness for our community's success providing housing, in large part an effort led by Mercer County Director of Human Services Marygrace Billek.

Mercer County is a place where the Board of Social Services operates to <u>provide</u> benefits - not primarily to deny benefits.

Mercer is a county where the Board of Freeholder wasted no time recognizing the problems that would occur by the change in application of the Emergency Assistance regulations and on June 23, 2016 passed resolution calling on the NJ State Legislature to reject proposed emergency assistance cuts.

The incredible safety net in Mercer County includes a prevention network that was robust in decreasing demand by providing relatively small amount of funding to keep families out

of homelessness; at HomeFront a family campus that should be the envy of the country; and a single shelter and day center where we can literally get the homeless person off the street 24 hours a day.

It is so important to recognize that not only has our community provided a response to meet a clear and immediate need for emergency services, but that this emergency system is the entry point for access to the services such as the City of Trenton CEAS center and over 20 partner programs designed to assist families and individuals into housing. The importance of these social services cannot be overstated as we know the clients we are serving have great needs that involve multiple factors such as mental health, substance abuse disorder, domestic violence, etc.

We want to call attention to two key points that are lost in the numbers:

While the state numbers show a dramatic decrease of 27.7% of GA payments between October 2015 and October 2016– this is in part a change in practice such as age 26 rule, documents required to apply, multiple appointments, and reported state review of cases.

In effect we closed the door to access to services.

While the Point in Time count as mandated by HUD shows a dramatic decrease in homelessness - the census data of the 2 primary providers in Mercer County, HomeFront and the Rescue Mission, does not support the level of decrease being reported. There are many other concerns around the process such as entire groups are being left out - we understand there is a statistical formula to offset.

This is an example of moving the mirrors and declaring the problem fixed. In the end we need to use this information to rebuild the safety net – we thank you for your support as your community representatives who deal with real lives and real people.

We need to work with government to reposition previous EA dollars from an individual eligibility to a needed service base-funding block.





Self Reported Disability


Self reported based on % on respondents








EA Voucher Income

COMMUNICATIONS:

Two (2) communications were discussed and approved for placement on the Formal Meeting on January 26, 2017.

RESOLUTIONS:

Forty- five Resolutions were discussed and approved for placement on the Agenda of January 26, 2017.

Regarding the proposed Resolution authorizing to execute a Competitive Contract with Motylek, LLC dba family transition support services to provide transportation services to support the families of Mercer County youth detained in Middlesex County Youth Detention Center for the period of January 1, 2017 through December 31, 2018 in the amount of \$156,000.00, Freeholder Walter requested the total cost for youth services to Middlesex County. She inquired about the total cost to operate a youth detention facility.

Freeholder Frisby asked for the cost savings on transferring youth to Middlesex County Juvenile Detention Center.

Andrew Mair, County Administrator said he would obtain that information.

Regarding the proposed Resolution authorizing to execute a Grant Agreement with the State of New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection for the County Environmental Health Act (CEHA) program for the period of July 1, 2016 to June 30, 2017 in the amount of \$344,470.00, Freeholder Walter requested a list of the CEJA officer responsibilities. She asked can the waste control program collect fees for violation of weigh in at the transfer stations.

Mr. Mair responded that the CEHA officer educates the community on environmental issues, inspects a variety of facilities that are required to meet department of environmental protection standards, including underground storage tanks, gas stations, recycling facilities, and collect fines when laws are broken. Mr. Mair added that the program can collect fees at the transfer stations.

Regarding the proposed Resolution authorizing to execute a deed with the township of Hopewell related to the transfer of 9% undivided interest of certain property known as Block 59, Lot 2; Block 60, Lots, 5, 6, 7, 7.01, 17, 18, 21, 27, 31, 32, 37, 38, 43, 47, and 50 (The Ted Stiles preserve at Baldpate Mountain) Hopewell Township, cost \$0.00, Freeholder Walter asked is the County following up with the Friends of Mercer County money. She mentioned that at Baldpate Mountain there are huge, old trees lining the driveway that have been cut down and why were they cut.

Mr. Mair responded that too much time has passed for us to make a reasonable and viable claim for the money. He said the Planning Director consulted with Jenn Rogers, Park Commission Naturalis, and she advised that the trees at Baldpate were removed as part of the Park Commission's Emerald Ash Borer Management Plan and the trees displayed symptoms of disease and stress and were removed for public safety. He added that the Park Commission is removing trees in high use areas with such symptoms to prevent injury and damage.

Regarding the proposed Resolution authorizing authorization of payment to True and Associates for airport liability- insurance for coverage involving acts of terrorism and war the Trenton- Mercer Airport for the period of January 1, 2017 to December 31, 2017 in the amount of \$33,000.00, Freeholder Walter asked why is there a not to exceed amount of \$40,000.00 when this is a true contract at \$32,187.00.

Mr. Mair replied that the initial quote for the subject insurance coverage was over \$39,000.00. He added that the Deputy County Counsel reviewed the Resolution and suggested changing the not to exceed amount to \$33,000.00, in light of receiving the second lower quote.

Regarding the proposed Resolution authorizing an Award of Bid to Levy Construction Company, Inc., for rebid of Trenton-Mercer Airport Walkway Canopy in the amount of \$1,258,200.00; period: 180 calendar days after notice to proceed, the Freeholder Board asked if the County builds a walkway canopy will the investment be lost after construction of a new terminal. The Freeholders inquired about the completion of the anticipated new terminal and when are the final detail/ version of the walkway canopy.

Mr. Mair explained that all efforts will be made to insure the walkway canopy is complimentary to the new terminal building. He said the construction of the new terminal is estimated to take 4-5 years and the detail of the walkway canopy is attached. (See attached "B" attached hereto and made a part hereof)
